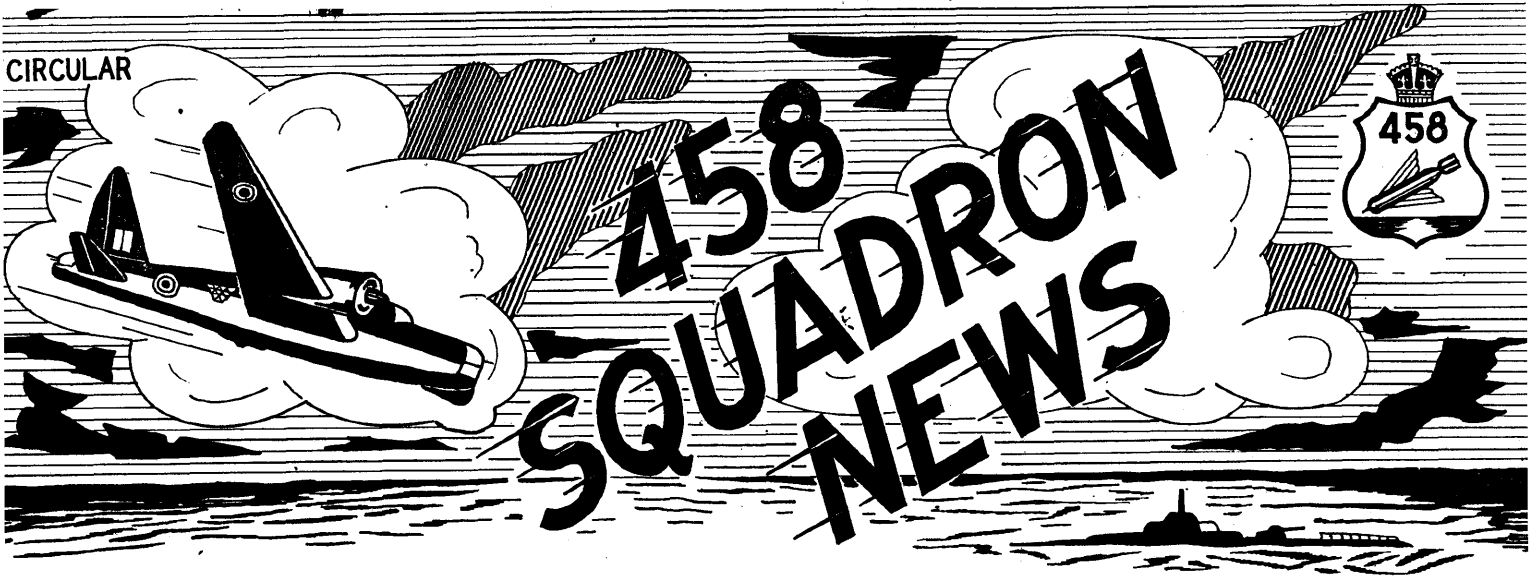

Cricket Comments:

"Run-to-Cover".

Four games have been played up to this point. Three have been won, one tied. Which is up to the usual standard. I don't know whether the Squadron team's successes, year after year, are due to ability or wise choice of opponents. A considerable amount of enthusiasm and team spirit might have something to do with it. Certainly this year there have been both of the latter. Plus some excellent organisation in selecting and notifying members of the teams. So far 19 players have been selected and played, which is good. First game was against Bob Bruce's department (Social Services). Bob himself opened the batting with Sam Barlow for 458 and they both set an example which subsequent Squadron openers have since hastened to follow. They departed without scoring. Allan Walker made 40 in his usual powerful style. 458 made 142 and the Department 137. This game was on October 26th at Centennial Park.

The second match was against the Western Suburbs branch of the Air Force Association and was played 12 a side. After the openers (the Old Firm) had amassed 2 between them, Lance Wood and Jack Bevan batted brilliantly with a sound display from Ern. Doman, who is an all-rounder of remarkable skill, and some valuable hitting from Tom Moore and Bob Millar. Tony Harris (slow left arm) then laid the opposition low by bowling straight. He took 4 wickets in one over, including his brother's.

Against the Air Force Club, 458 had the help of two new players, Frank Ward and Cyril Irwin, of very considerable abilities. Cyril Irwin kept wickets and Frank bowled batted and particularly fielded brilliantly. Doug Bennett batted as well as he has ever done, and Tom Moore again was among the runs (something will have to be done about Tom's place in the batting order). With the bowling Eric Munkman was missed badly. Apart from Frank Ward who bowled well but without luck, the bowling was innocuous. 458 did well to tie.

There was a marked allround improvement in the Squadron performance in the next game played (against Arnidale College Old Boys). This was probably due to practice.

Lance Wood shewed his ability with the bat in the unaccustomed position of opener. Dud McKay though out of touch made 28 and Ernie Doman again passed 30. The main improvement though, was in bowling and fielding. Allan Walker and Jack Baker bowled really well. Dud McKay turned the ball from the leg as only he can on macadam. He had better shew someone else how it is done before he goes to Queensland.

One final word about the captaincy. Sam Barlow has taken over from Geoff.

Burgess, who is now in the Country. Sam's captaincy has been both successful and popular, and, in this writer's opinion, skillful. Captaincy seems to have affected his batting performance but that should be only a temporary result. The scores (those I am allowed space for) were:

ANZAC DAY--1953--!!

THERE WILL BE AN ALL-STATES 458 SQUADRON REUNION IN SYDNEY ON ANZAC DAY 1953 !

Acting on a suggestion from the Queensland branch, Squadron Committees in all states have agreed that each year in one or other of the State capitals Anzac Day will be made a rallying time and all members who can will be there at that capital to march with 458 Squadron and take part in the associated functions. A Federal 458 Conference will be held at the same time to discuss matters of interstate 458 interest. All states will be represented, even if only by proxy.

As members may have gathered from earlier articles in this issue, there was some initial division of opinion as to where it should be in 1953. N.S.W. and Victoria nominated Brisbane; but Queensland and South Australia voted for Sydney. After a fusillade of telegrams in all directions it was finally agreed unanimously that Sydney would be accorded the honour of staging the first Grand Reunion on Anzac Day 1953.

The Sydney Committee has already made the following arrangements:

- April 24th. 7.p.m. Wreath laid on the Cenotaph, Martin Place, in memory of 458 s Dead.
7.30 p.m. Grand Squadron Reunion at 330 George Street, Sydney
- April 25th (Anzac Day) The March. 458 members assemble at 9.15 a.m. outside the Transport building Macquarie Street. After the March, members will meet informally at the Long Bar, Hotel Australia and later at the Air Force Club, 2nd. Floor, 330 George Street.
- April 26th. Squadron Interstate Golf Tournament (to be arranged). Special Anzac Trophy.

The interstate Conference will be held during the week-end, when we know the times of delegates arrival in Sydney.

It will be up to members in all states (particularly in N.S.W., the Host state) to make a special effort so that this is all great success.
