

Vale Flt Lt Bryan Quinlan DFC. RCAF



It is with great sadness to announce the death of Bryan Quinlan. Bryan served with 458 Squadron as a pilot from late 1942 to mid-1943. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross whilst serving with 458 Squadron for his part in the sinking of an enemy 11,000-ton merchant ship on

14th July, 1943. The then Pilot Officer Quinlan also attacked an enemy destroyer on 13th March, 1943 with results of this attack unknown. Bryan went on to serve with an all Canadian 407 Squadron for a 2nd tour of operations. Bryan was our Canadian Flight correspondent to the 458 Newsletter for over 20 years. He kept us informed the world over of all activities and events involving Canadian 458 Veterans and



families. Rest in Peace Bryan. Our loving thoughts and sympathies go out to his wife Joan and the Quinlan family.

FLIGHT REPORTS



United Kingdom Flight Report by Keith Wilkinson

Here's a rare treat to see close-up the type of aircraft



that was familiar to members of 458 Squadron...some photographs taken from inside the Wellington bomber currently under restoration at RAF Cosford Museum in Shropshire, England.

I was given special access to the interior of

the aircraft, one of only two that survive in the world. The Irish linen that covered the geodetic frame has been stripped off and is being replaced. This currently allows you to see right through the structure, which was designed by the bouncing



bomb inventor Barnes Wallis. The Wellington is being restored in



the museum's conservation centre and access is normally restricted to open days. The photographs show the work in progress. They also show details that cannot be seen when the plane is intact.

Work is taking many years to complete but eventually the plan is for the completed aircraft to be back on display to the public at Hendon in London. This Wellington was used as a post-war trainer and took part in the epic war film The Dambusters.

Bob Springall - a potted wartime history by Tony Springall



At the Runnymede Air Force Memorial, August 2019

Dad was born in 1922 in South East London and upon leaving school became an apprentice instrument maker with Elliott Brothers. When war as declared he was advised that he was in a Reserved Occupation and therefore was exempt from military service. He was not happy and tried to join the Royal Artillery but was turned down as he was under 8 stone but the Royal Air Force snapped him up as he had the skills in very short supply. Basic training was in Great Yarmouth and whilst there he was summoned to see the Commanding Officer who told him that Elliott Brothers wanted him back but dad politely refused the invitation. As he was already qualified he did not undertake trade training but instead sat what were called the "West Drayton"

Tests" to prove his efficiency and received his posting to 51 Maintenance Unit, RAF Lichfield where aircraft were prepared for squadron operational use after being received from the manufacturers. It was staffed by mainly pre-war regulars who were married and lived on camp therefore when the call came for someone to join 153 Squadron it was almost inevitable who would be sent.

Arriving in Algeria on a troopship with the 51st Highland Division it was off to Maison Blanche and the Beaufighters which had a multitude of roles. The squadron left the main airfield for Algiers and moved to Reghaia near the coast where off duty moments could be spent swimming in the sea.

When 458 Squadron arrived at Foggia, dad received his posting and joined the vast tented encampment that was Foggia airfield outside of Naples to work on the Wellington Bombers with which the squadron was equipped. The winter of 1944 was long and wet which proved as equally difficult for the ground crew as for the aircrew operating from the airfield. Christmas 1944 is still remembered as he was able to visit Rome which had been liberated in June to hear the Pope speak to the thousands of allied servicemen crowded into St Peters square.

The move to Gibraltar was undertaken in a Dakota and at this point various Wellingtons were equipped with Leigh Lights in an anti U Boat role, flying over the Mediterranean. The period in Gibraltar is fondly remembered after the trials and tribulations of Italy and it enabled various members of the squadron to fashion small canoes from the drop tanks of aircraft to scull around the harbour.

With the disbandment of 458 Squadron it was back to Algeria to clear up damaged aircraft and the multitude of other stores before being finally repatriated back to the UK after more than three years away.

THE 2019 ERIC J. JEWELL AWARD

The 2019 Eric J. Jewell Award was presented to twenty-one Cadets from 303, 304, 305, 307, 314, 315, 318, 322, 324, 330, 331, 336, 345, 507, and 508 Squadrons, and to three AAFC staff attending the 103rd International Four Days Marches Nijmegen, in the Netherlands, during the month of July.

2019 Eric J. Jewell Award – Cadets and Staff Four Days March in Nijmegen, Netherlands, to Commemorate Operation *Market Garden*, 17-25 September 1944.



The 2019 recipients of the Eric J. Jewell Award, Australian Air Force Cadets and staff from 3Wing and 5 Wing, participated in this year's "Vierdaagse" (Dutch for "the four days") walk that has taken place since 1909, being based at Nijmegen, Netherlands since 1916. Marching a scintillating 40 kilometres each day from Tuesday to Friday, 16 – 19 July 2019, and starting early morning (I mean early!), covering 166.6 kilometres in total. A distance that left all with lasting impressions and memories, arousing many emotions, joy, struggle, contemplation, esprit de corps, mateship, fatigue, pain, perspiration, accomplishment, unity, victory. All with the backdrop, history, location, sights, and remnants of battles of World War II (including Operation *Market Garden*), and a handy reminder of both 458 and FLGOFF Eric Jewell, carried throughout the journey.

Each day of the march begins and ends at the same location - **Camp Heumensoord**, but has a unique route each day.

MARCH TO NIJMEGEN continues....

Day 1, Tuesday July 16. The team march out on the first day:





Day 2, Wednesday July 17

Day 3, Thursday July 18:





Day 4, Friday July 19. The fourth and final time the Team march through the boots and helmet of camp Heumensoord, Nijmegen.

Not all were able to attend on 21 September

2019, but those that did were honoured to be on the John Frost Bridge (the rebuilt Arnhem Road Bridge) where, remembering Allied *Operation Market Garden* and 75 years earlier,

"A small British force captured the north end of the Arnhem road bridge, denying use of the intact bridge to German forces. After the ground forces failed to relieve the paratroopers on time, they were overrun on 21 September. At the same time that XXX Corps' tanks moved over the Nijmegen bridge, 36 hours late, after seizing it from the Germans, the British paratroopers at the Arnhem bridge were capitulating, unable to hold on any longer. The remainder of the



British 1st Airborne Division was trapped in a small pocket west of the Arnhem bridge, which was evacuated on 25 September after sustaining heavy casualties."
